From an Indian agent's report 1903:

They supply a large part of the fish and game required for the local market, and perform sundry services for the white people of the city.

Poplar Island a small cluster of poplar trees in the Fraser River between New Westminster and Queensborough, was once a smallpox quarantine where Indians from throughout the valley died and were buried.

In Bridgeview, the Kwantlen settlement was divided between the Langley and the Musqueam around the turn of the century. The Langley still hold oil and mineral rights beneath the four acres of their former reserve, but both bands surrendered title to the land in the late 1950s.

The island is still listed on some maps as an Indian reserve, and was recorded by the McKenna-McBride commission of 1916 as belonging to "all Coast tribes."

Over the years it has been used by a variety of industries, and the city of New Westminster took possession of the island in 1945 for \$16,000. It was later sold to a forest products company.

New Westminster in the late 1880s was a vital, bustling commercial centre for European and Chinese settlers, and for the Indian community.

The Kwantlen Band frequently played host to large gatherings of Indians from throughout the region. In 1885, 3500 Indians converged on the city for the governor-general's visit.

It was a period of rapid change for the Fraser Valley Indians. Although the Catholic Church held tight control on the Kwantlen Band's social life, at the turn of the century Indian gamblers toured the coast, and the traffic in Chinese brandy had the local constabulary working overtime.

When the canneries were working full steam. Indian and Chinese labourers outnumbered whites in the laboring workforce, and Indian fishermen competed successfully with white fishermen.

Indian leaders were among those arrested during the first fishermen's strike on the coast, the short-lived shutdown by the Fraser River Fishermen's Benevolent Assoc., in 1898.

Well into the 20th century, old Indian women walked up and down New Westminster streets with Salish baskets for sale.

An old Kwantlen cemetery of about 40 acres on Hjorth Road in Surrey, which belonged to the Langley band, was surrendered in the late 1950s, Chief Alfred Joe Gabriel, of the Kwantlen Tribe, remembers that Surrey needed the cemetery for a school.

"I thought they might keep a corner of it, but the last time I was there I could hardly tell where it used to be. I can't remember if we tried to stop them taking it, but they said they were going to take it anyway."

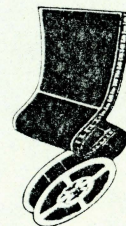
