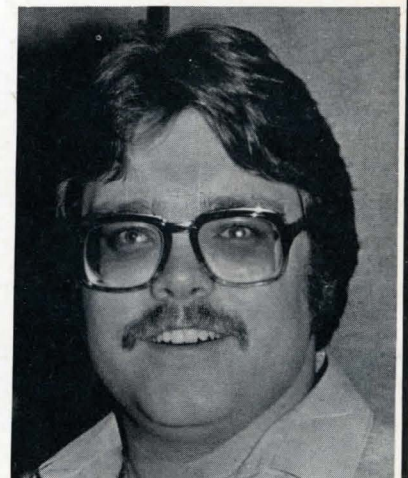

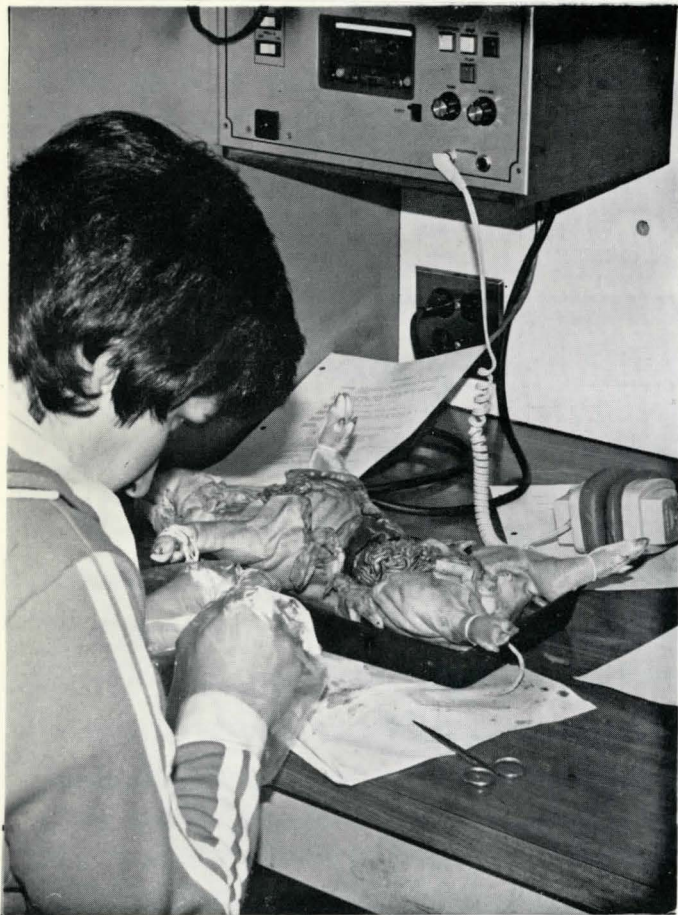

Surrey campus is the largest in size and enrollment of the Kwantlen facilities. A centre courtyard provides peace and relaxation for its population.

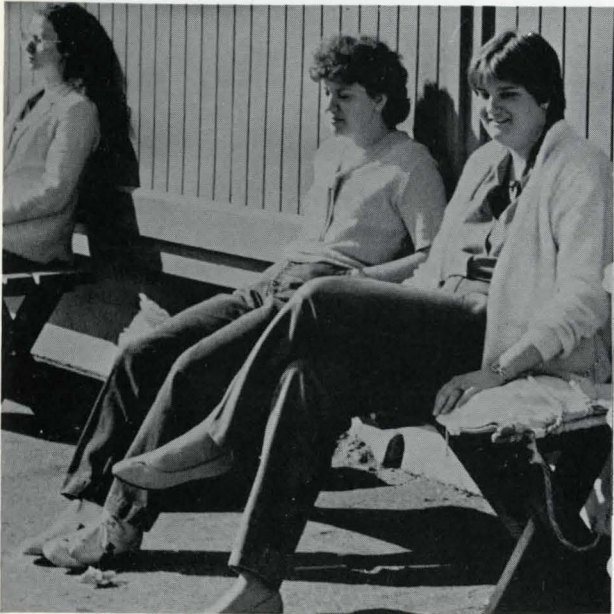
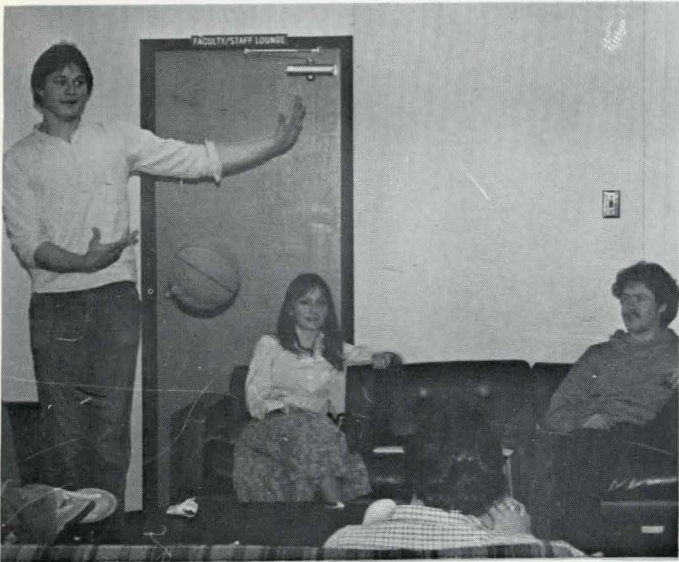
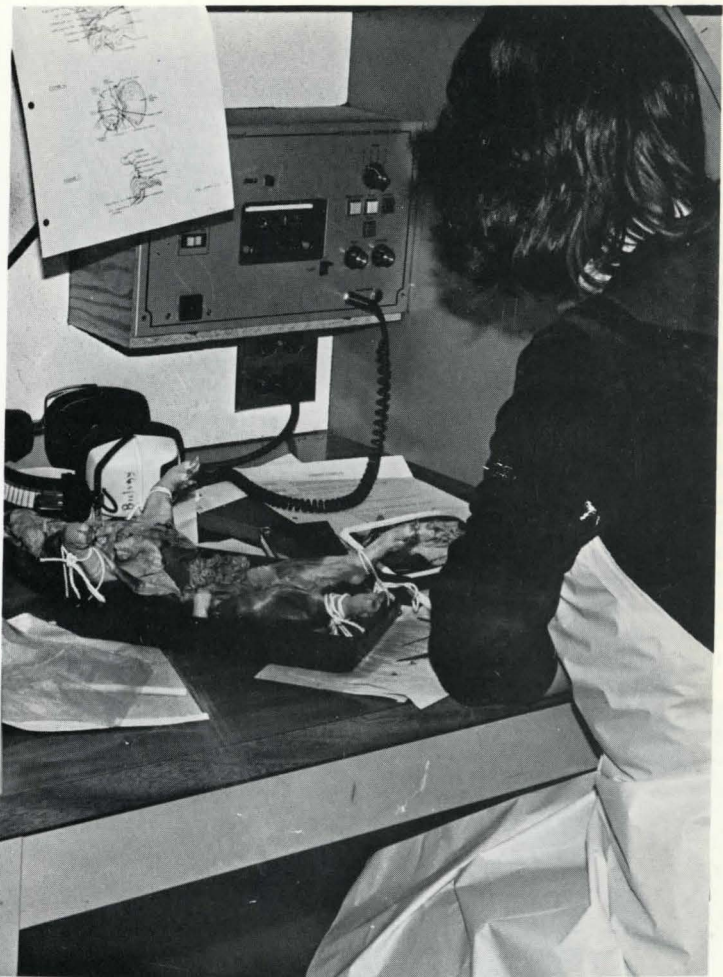
Housed on this campus is the Student Association headquarters, where the executive is kept busy all year fighting for student rights, providing entertainment, and generally making college life better for the students.

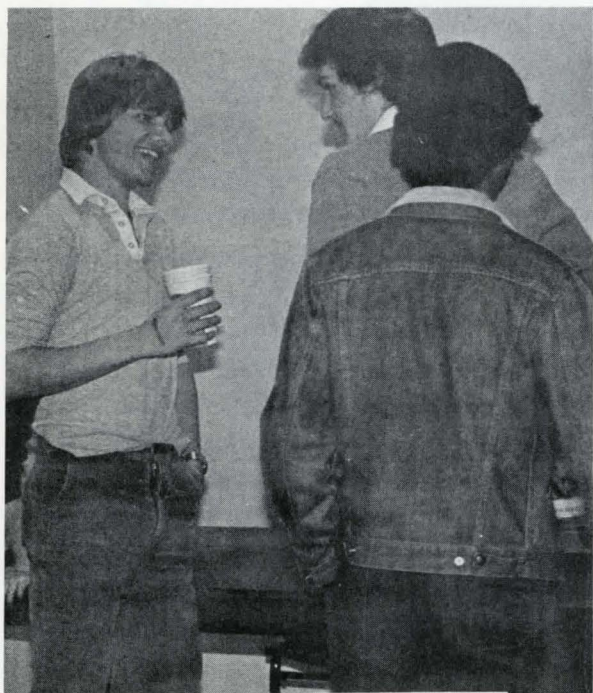
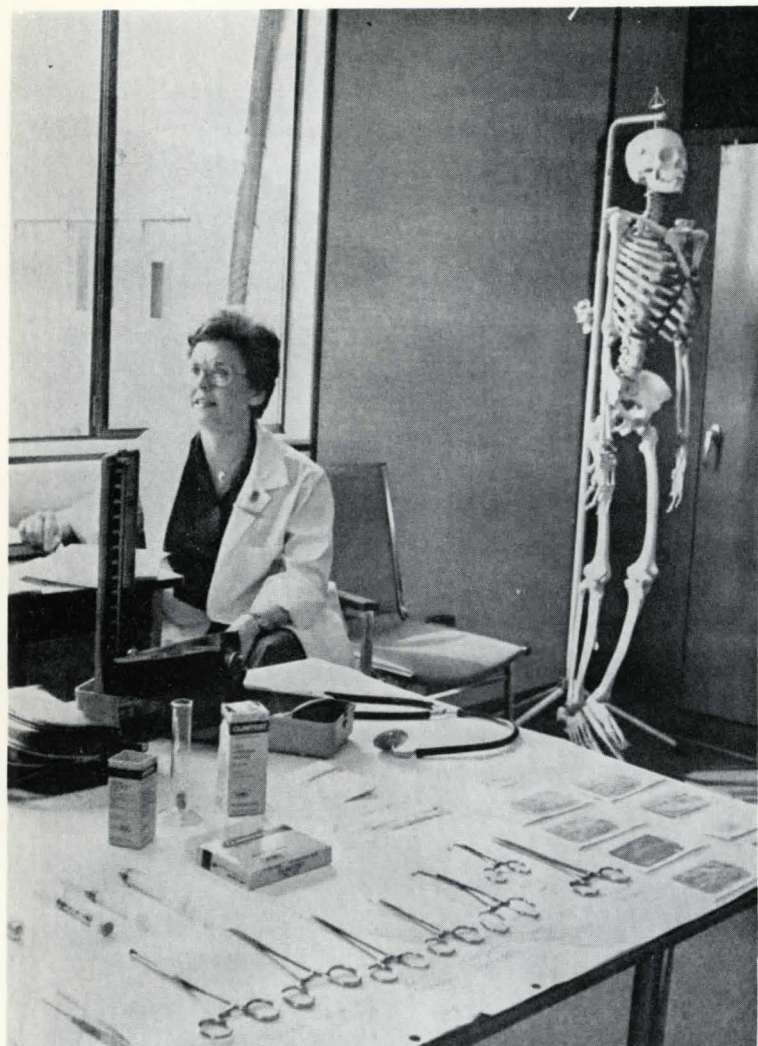
Calgary from February 5th to 7th.

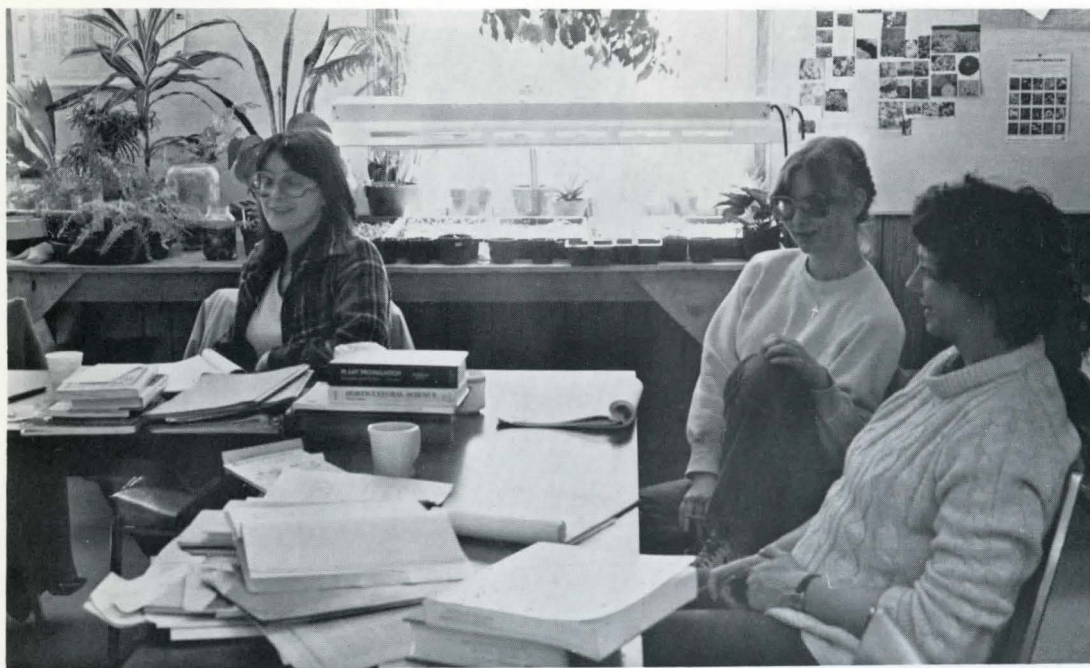

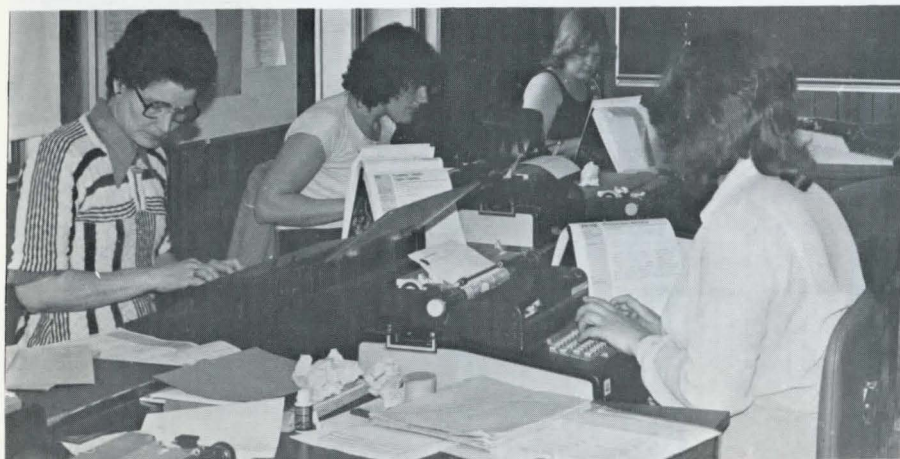
Langley



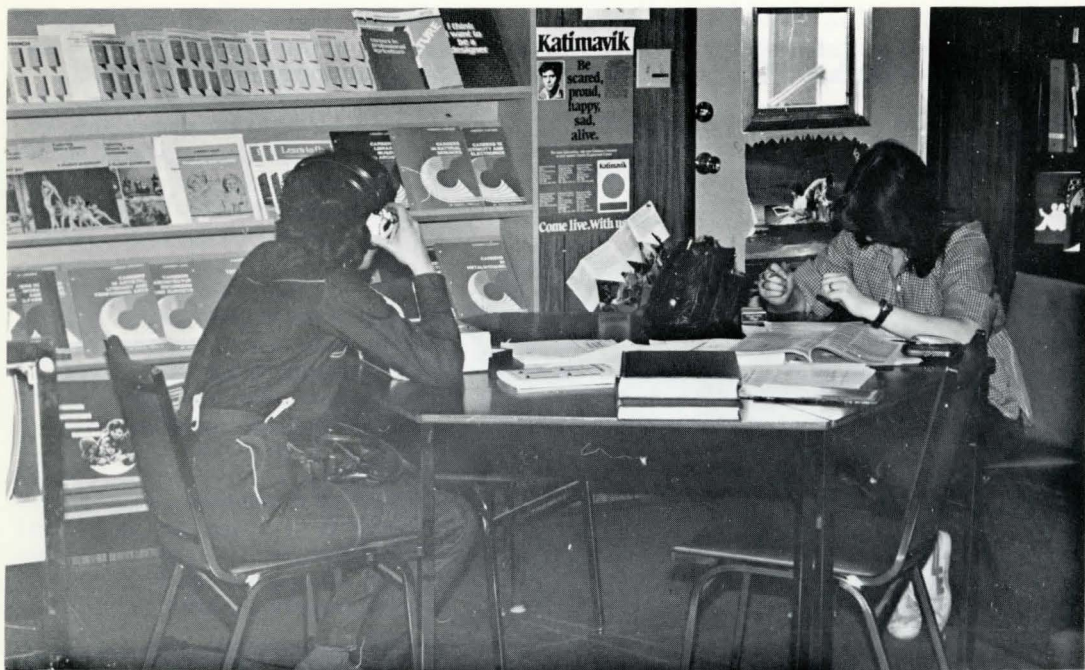
A friendly, relaxed atmosphere prevails on Kwantlen's furthest campus.

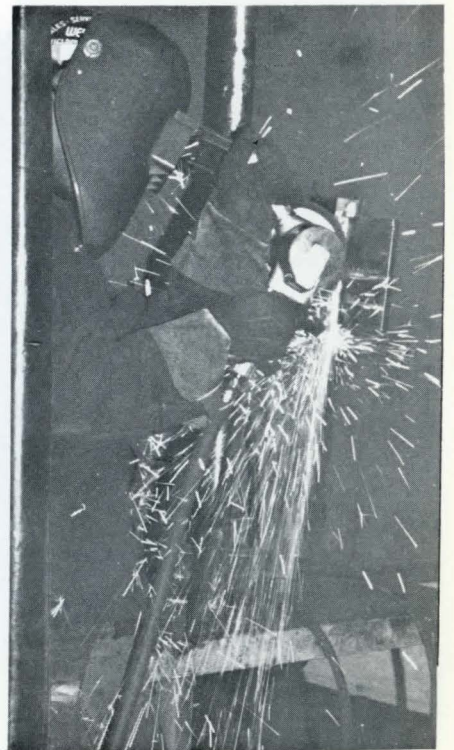
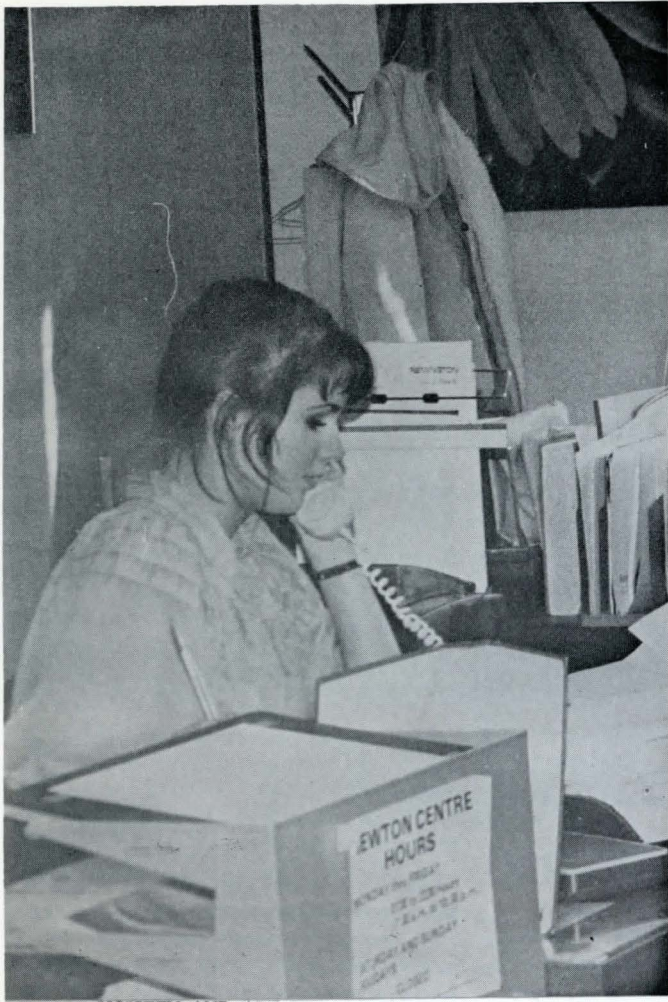
A new campus has nothing to lose and everything to gain.

The instructors are qualified and the students are more than willing to learn the necessary skills that are required to survive in today's workforce.

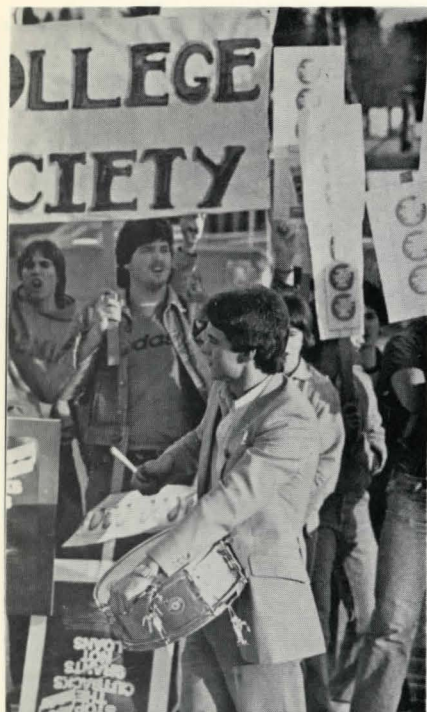
The central administration of the college is at Newton and until permanent facilities are built they remain an integral part of Newton and its progressive attitude.

These people are the Student Association.

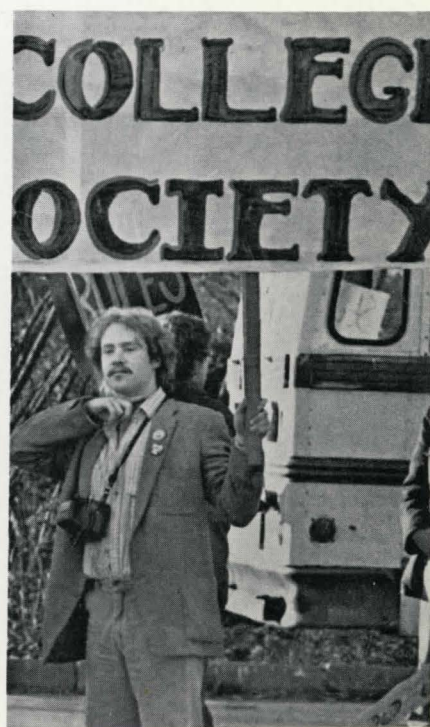
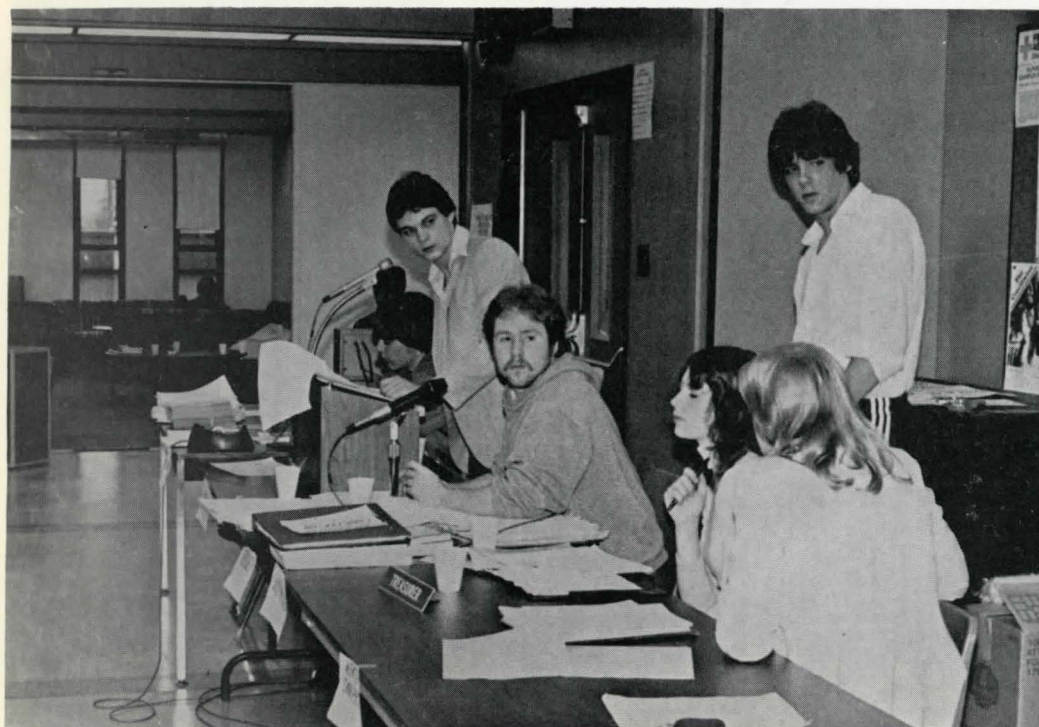
It was the first year for the Association and they started from scratch and worked their way up, inch by inch.

They wanted to inform the students of what was happening both inside and outside the school, make them aware of things that affected them, whether they knew it or not.

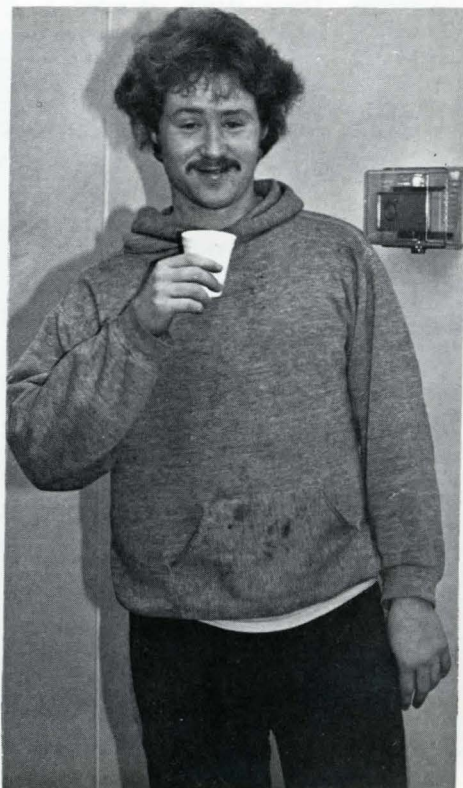
The future looks good for the Association, and if they keep going the way they have, the only result will be a better educated, more aware student population that is in tune with the times...

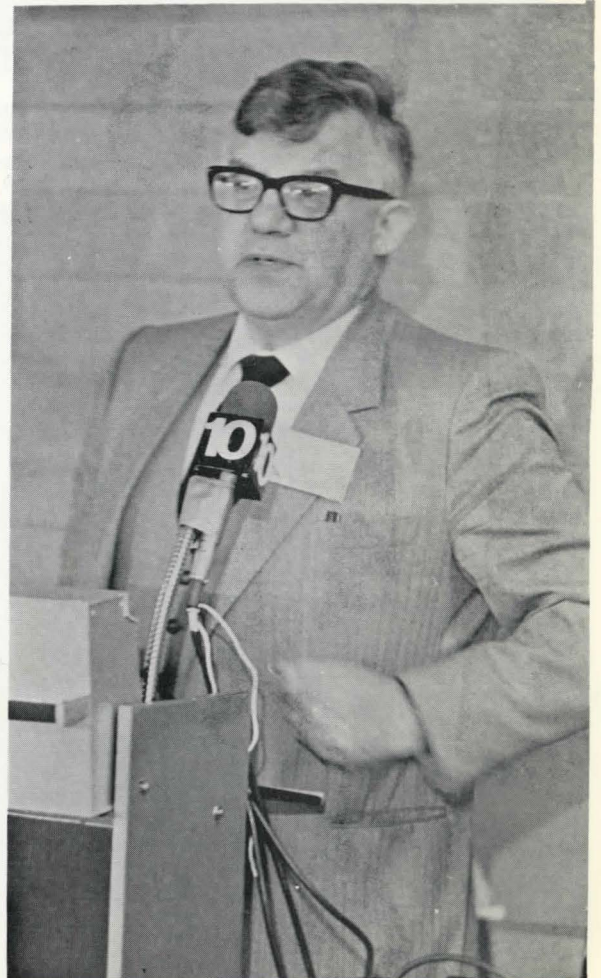

Cutback protests

The March 12 protest, held in downtown Vancouver was in reaction to the planned cutbacks by the government.

It was a big concern to many groups but students of the lower mainland colleges and universities got out and protested and showed that they cared about the quality of their education.

Approximately one thousand students turned out on the dull grey day to march from the Queen Elizabeth Theatre to a Robson Square rally.

It did what it was supposed to do and attracted liberal coverage by the media and publicized its cause.

The march was the highlight of an entire week of protest organized to op-

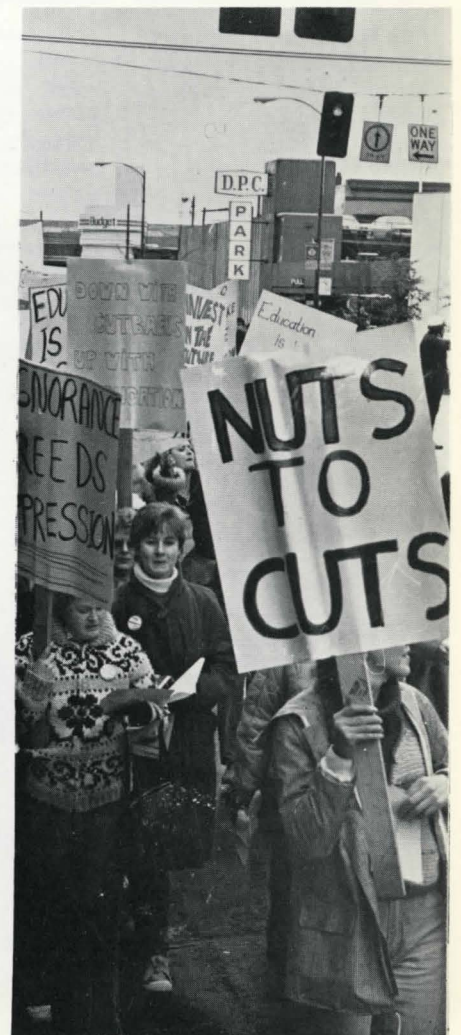
pose planned government cutbacks all across the country.

It was almost reminiscent of the 60's marches and for the first time in a decade students were raising their voices in opposition to government policies.

The protest was organized by the Canadian Federation of Students, a nationwide group that is trying to organize students into a solid union to confront the government on issues that affect students.

There will be protests in the future and hopefully Kwantlen students will participate and voice their opinions on issues that will affect post-secondary education in the future.

Journalism



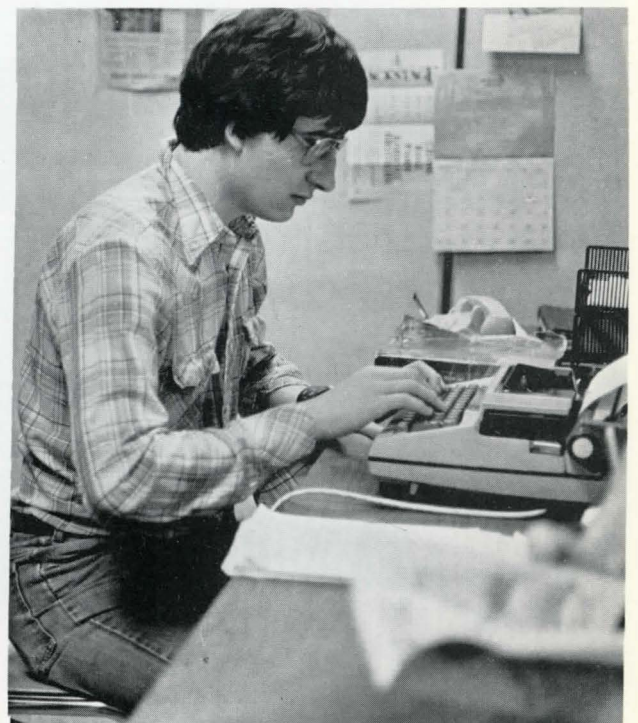
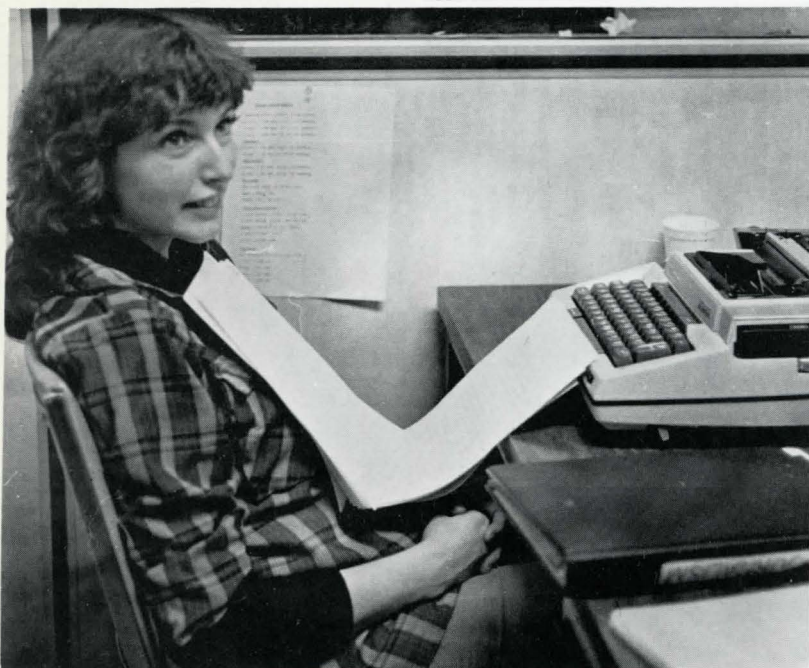
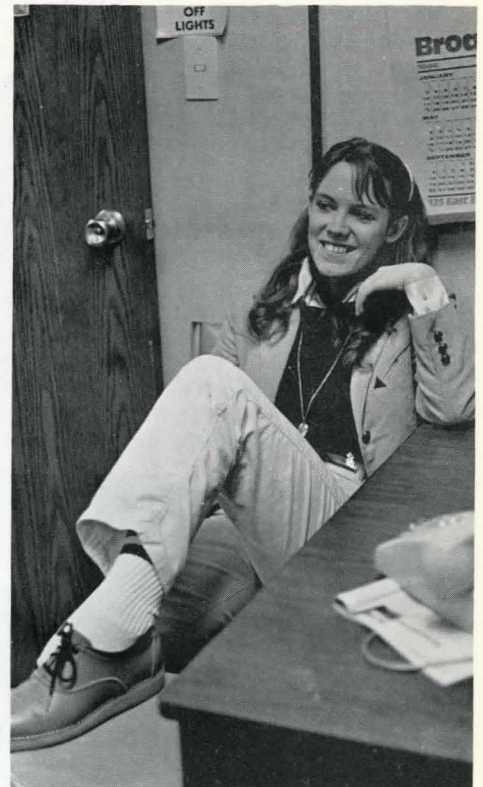
The Richmond campus Journalism program has become involved with a great many aspects of the college this year.

From the production of the Kwantlen Comment newspaper to the creation of signs and brochures, students in the program are kept busy indeed.

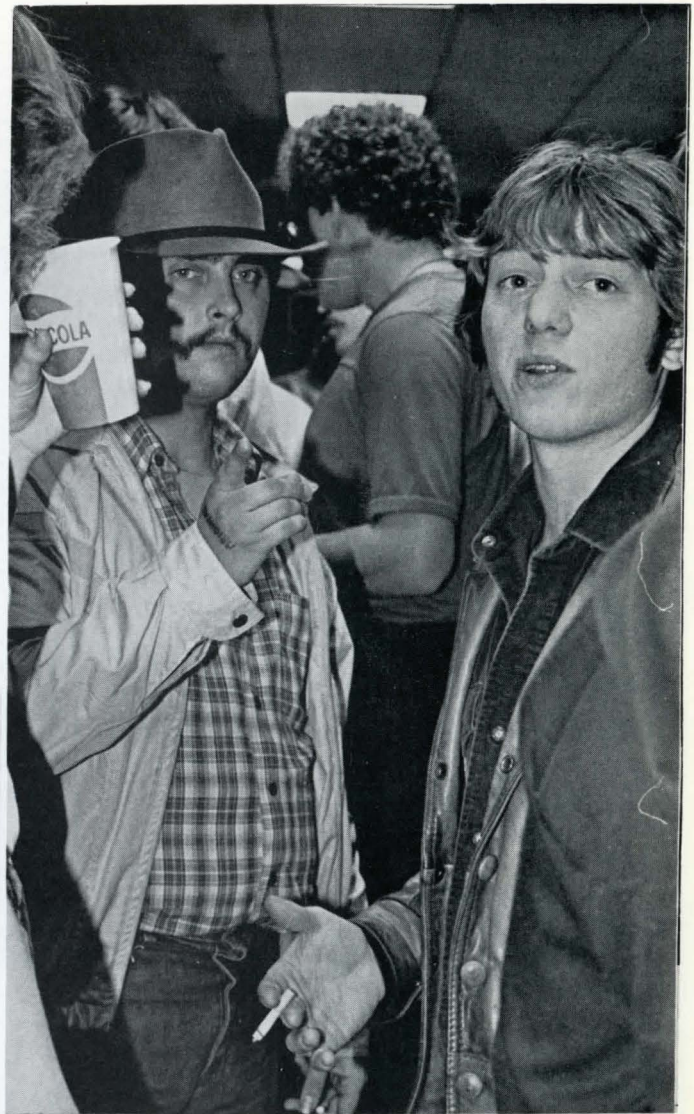
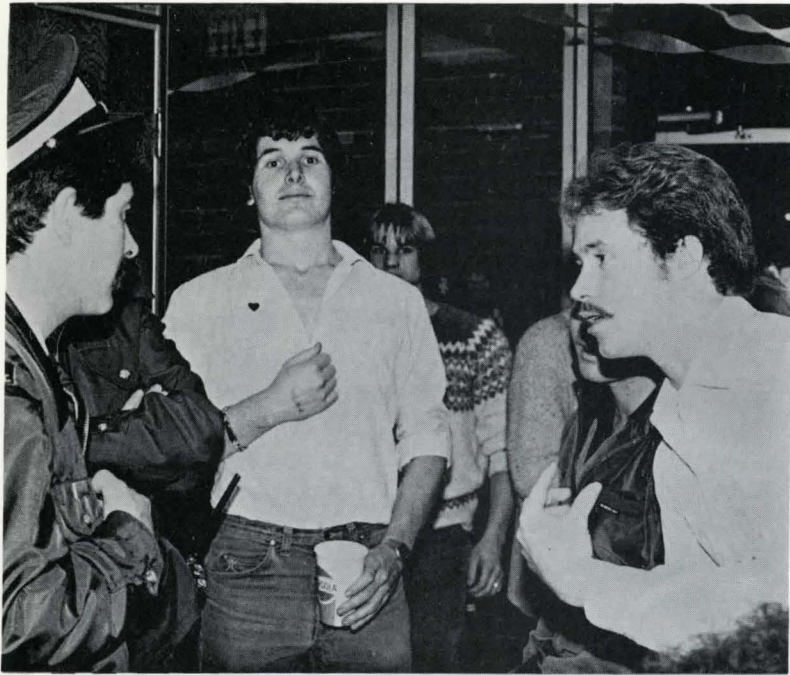

Pub nights are a much looked forward to part of college life. It is a time to unwind and get to know other people around the campus.

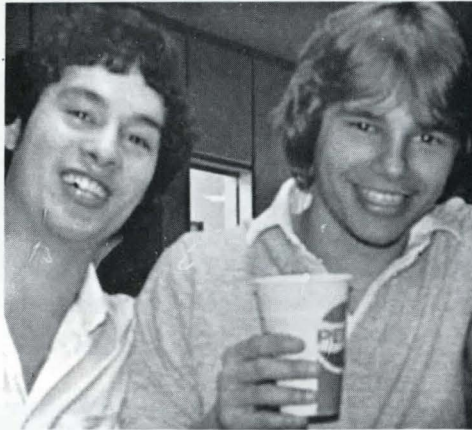
Most of the pub nights highlight a special occasion such as Halloween, Christmas, Valentine's Day, etc. which lends a certain theme aspect to the affair.

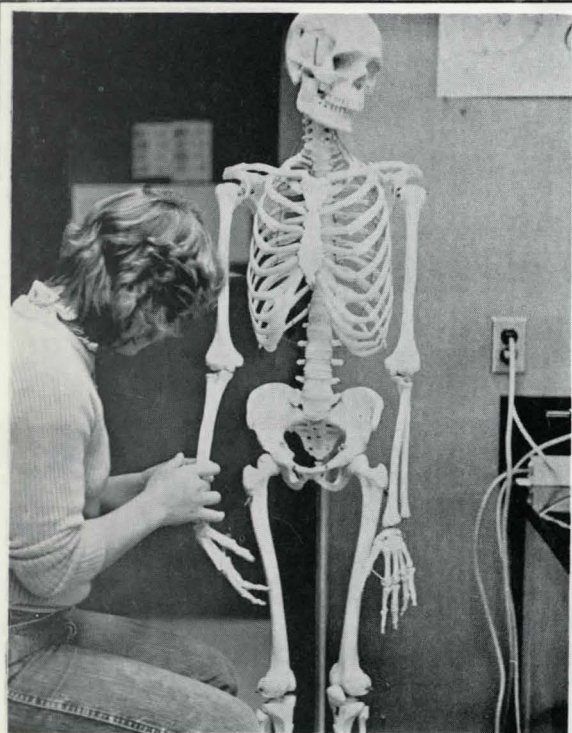
Everyone had a good time and managed to get rid of some of the tension that is part of a student's life, as well.

A big thanks to the Student Association for their backing to make these evenings possible for us. It was a lot of fun.



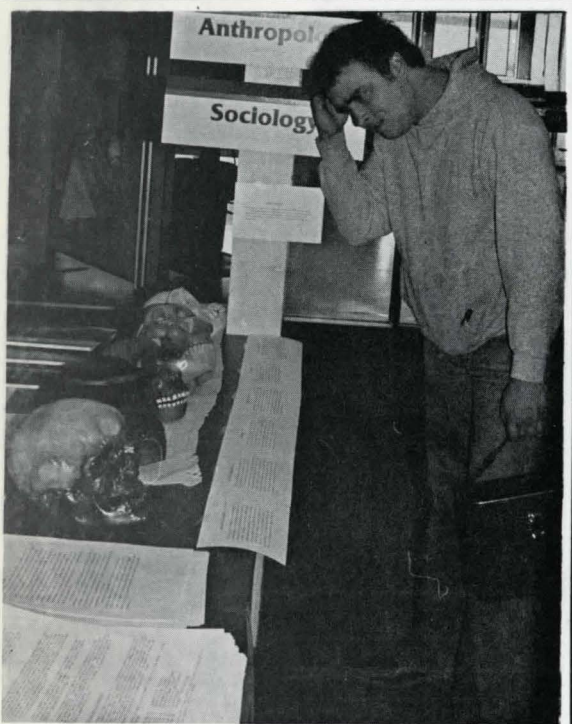

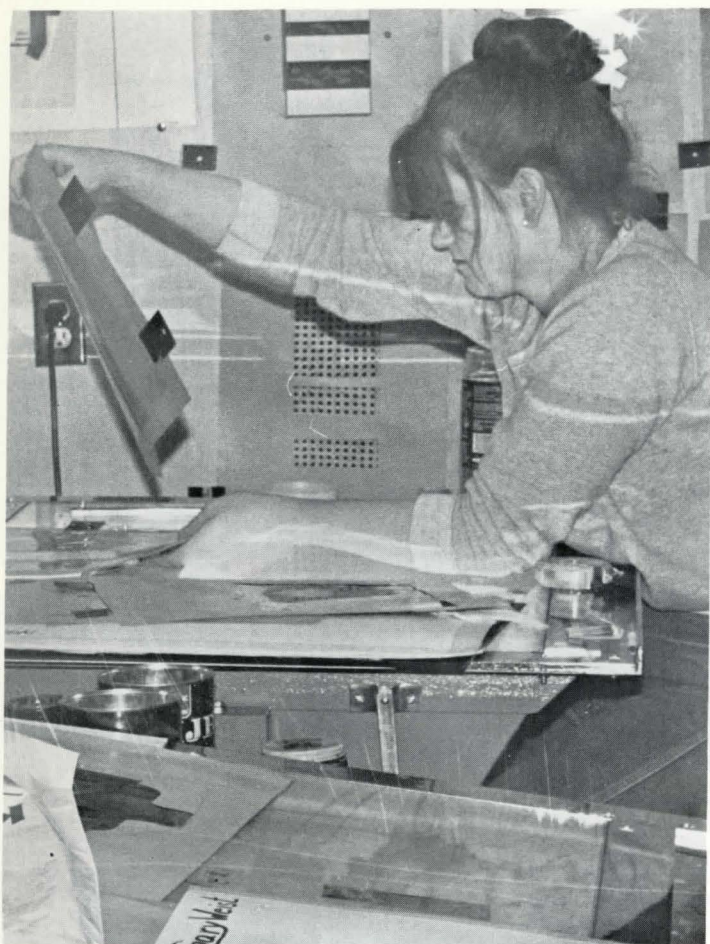

Welding



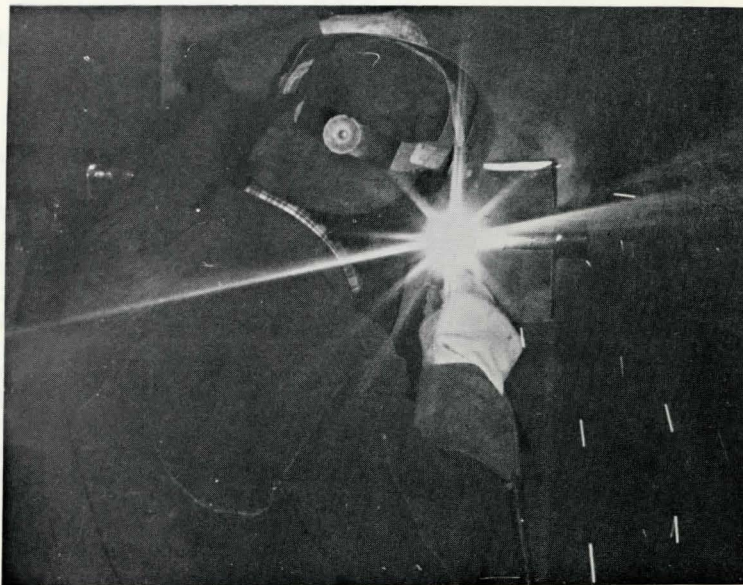
The Newton Centre campus offers a welding program on a continuous in-take basis.

Fashion Design



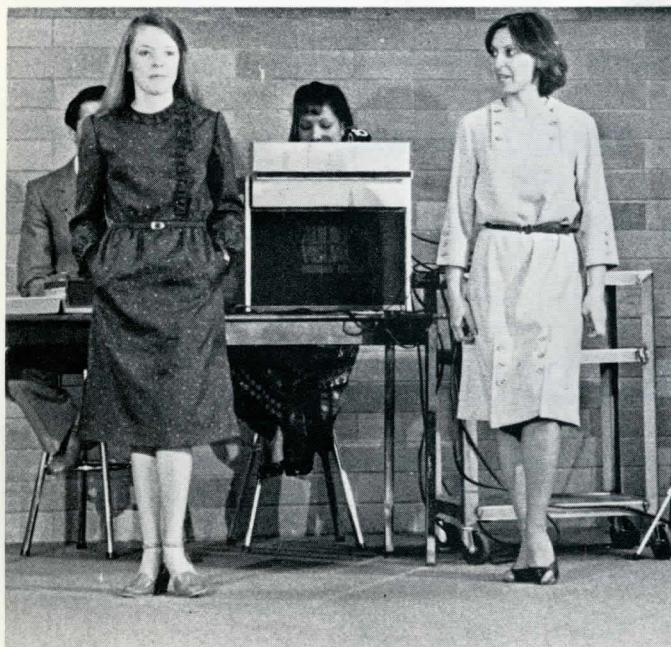

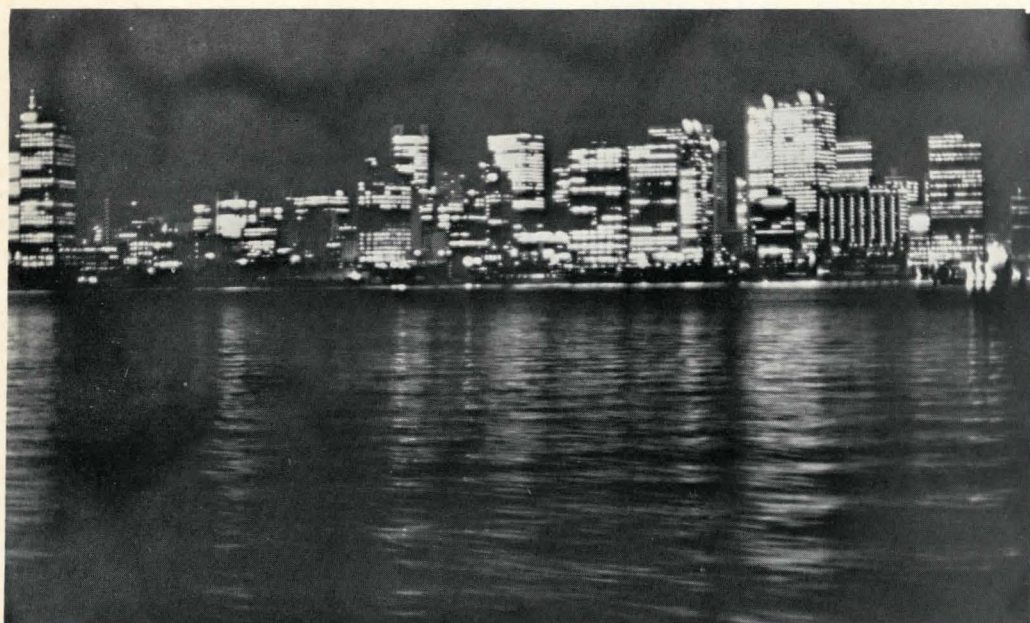
