College Board greets four new members

Andrew Milne, Chairman, Kwantlen College Board of Governors, welcomed four new board members who attended an initial orientation meeting on Tuesday, June 16 at the Surrey campus. The 10-member board now has six men, four women, and includes representatives of various cultures.

Beryl Kirk of Crescent Beach has an MBA in industrial relations and policy from McGill University, significant experience in labour relations and management, as well as experience as a librarian prior to taking her MBA.

"Her knowledge in the labour relations field will be valuable as the College prepares for the next round of collective bargaining," said Milne.

Amrit K. Dhaliwal of Delta has an MBA from UBC and a M.A. in English from Punjab University in India. She has a strong business and insurance background, and is fluent in English, Hindi and Punjabi.

"We are gratified that Ms. Dhaliwal will be serving with us, especially since the College communities in the south Fraser region are home to a rich variety of cultures," Milne commented. "Her business expertise and knowledge of other cultures will help Kwantlen build more effective partnerships with both industry and community."

Lida Wegleitner of Surrey has a B.Sc. in nursing from the University of Saskatchewan and was director of education services at Langley Memorial Hospital prior to her retirement in 1990.

"Ms. Wegleitner's expertise in the health field will serve the College well as we evaluate and develop programs in health sciences and human services," Milne commented. "Her involvement with and commitment to the Surrey Access for All Committee is invaluable as Kwantlen plans facilities and services that are available to persons with disabilities."

Christopher H. Humble of North Delta has a B.Comm. from the University of Toronto and substantial expertise in the human resource, training and industrial relations fields.

"As Kwantlen College continues to grow each year, recruitment and management of employees is a significant consideration in the governance of the institution," said Milne. "Mr. Humble will help to guide us in these matters."

Milne — who had his appointment with the board extended for one year — took

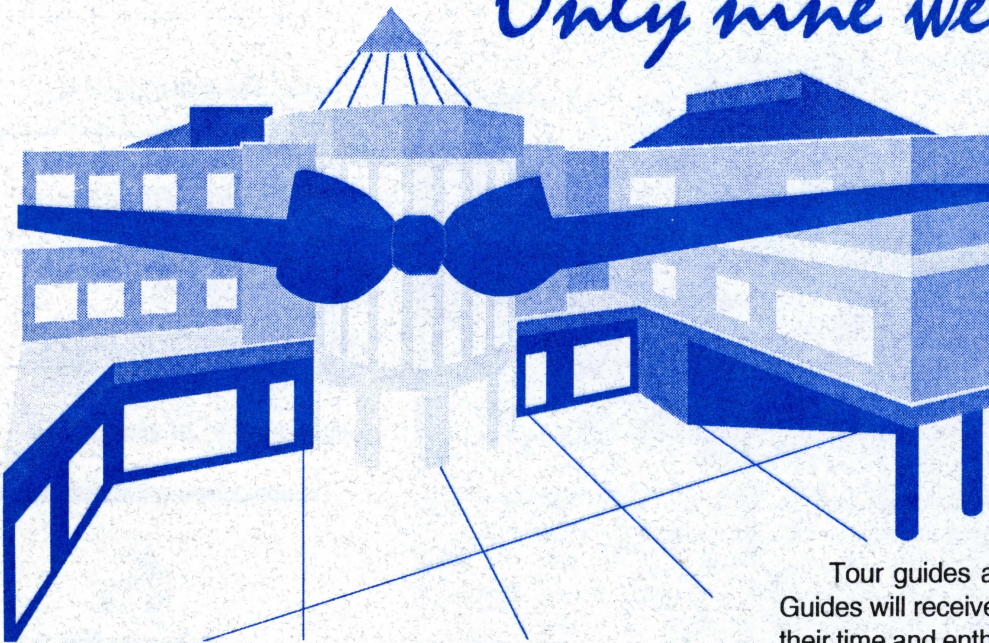
a few moments at the meeting to recognize the contributions of outgoing members Roger Bernatzki, Douglas Brawn and Margaret Montgomery.

Only nine weeks to go . . .



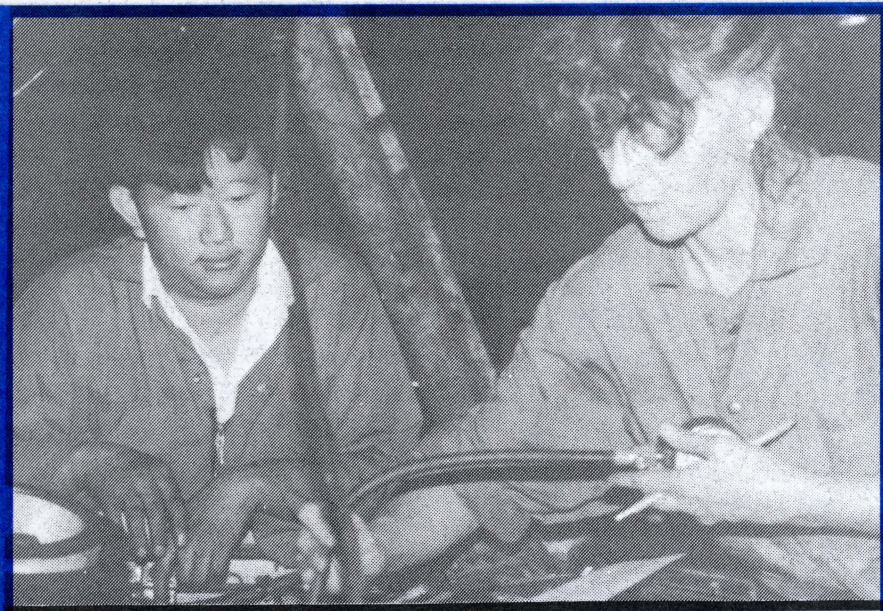

Apprenticeship training welcomes return of Kwantlen students

Newton campus instructor Manfred Baur is feeling justifiably proud lately, as graduates of Kwantlen's automotive mechanics program return to the College to complete their automotive apprenticeship after four years of hard work. The 9-month program is the first step for students who continue their training to meet requirements for automotive service technician journeyman papers.

"We currently have 16 students completing their fourth and final study period before receiving full apprenticeships, and eight are Kwantlen grads who started out with the auto mechanics program. It's a testament to the quality of the program and the commitment of our students," said Baur.

The auto mechanics program features a 70/30 split of class time to shop work, and allows students to study at their own pace given past experience or training. Graduates go on to work in the field, and many pursue full apprenticeship certification under the auspices of the Ministry of Labour. Apprenticeship training requires six weeks of study per year while working in the industry.

Students now in the program are often acting on a lifelong aptitude for mechanics. "I've always had an interest in mechanics, but the men in my family didn't foster it. I took a long time coming to my decision to return to school," says Kandy Besse, a nurse who continues to be on-call while studying, and whose son took the program last year.

Rick Liew currently works in a dealership, and recognizing the value of certification, was encouraged by his employer to pursue formal training. Both students plan to continue their apprenticeship training.

Doug Richmond is the apprenticeship instructor at Newton, and Ministry of Labour final testing and certification is done at the Newton campus.

Daycare

Kwantlen College will be opening its first daycare at the Richmond Campus on September 1. The daycare will be closely associated with the Early Childhood Education program, acting as a lab school for students.

Spaces will be available for children aged 1 1/2 through 5 years. The daycare will operate from 7:45 a.m. - 6:00 p.m., Monday to Friday. The admission policy is based on five points, including:

- Full-time daycare needs will be given preference, however part-time full day care may be available if space can be matched with another family.
- First preference will be given to children of registered students and staff who require full-time daycare.
- Second preference will be given to children of registered students and staff who require full day part-time care, which can be matched with another family.
- Third preference will be given to children of community members who require full-time daycare.
- Fourth preference will be given to children of community members who require full day part-time care, which can be matched with another family.

Projected fees for the daycare are \$885/month for 18 months-3 years, \$540/month for 3 to 5 years, and \$45/day for part-time care. Subsidies for fees may be available for eligible families through the Ministry of Social Services. Kwantlen's Student Association may be making subsidies available for students with children — information on eligibility for these subsidies is available from the Richmond Daycare office at 599-2695.

Applications for admission to the daycare may be picked up at any College library beginning June 29. Applications will be accepted at the **Richmond Campus library only** beginning July 6, 9am. A \$100 non-refundable deposit will be required to hold confirmed spaces.

An information session for interested parents will be held on July 2 from 6-8pm at the daycare at the new Richmond Campus, 8771 Lansdowne Rd.
