The position of Manager, Facilities is new and it centralizes responsibility for repair and maintenance services. Responsibilities include repair and maintenance of campus facilities, telephone systems, utilities, mechanical systems, grounds maintenance, janitorial services, parking, security, safety, and College-wide mail and delivery services. Additional responsibilities include coordination of the planning and implementation of additions or alterations to College facilities.

The College is exploring the feasibility of an employee exchange program with other **B.C.** colleges and institutes.



Interlock services are paid for by the College.



(An open letter to the College community from Jack Newberry, Acting President)

The College reorganization is nearing completion. The goal of the reorganization was to improve the communication between the College administration and the faculty and staff and to enhance the quality of the functioning of the College. I believe that we are beginning to see positive results.

Change is always unsettling and it can create disruption within an organization. It is my perception that the changes occurring at the College have been achieved with a minimum of disruption and I want to thank all of you for your cooperation and help in making the reorganization a relatively smooth transition.

Work is progressing on the plans for the New Surrey Campus. Many of you have been involved in the facilities requirement study and information is now being compiled for presentation to architects. We should soon be able to make some specific announcements about the project as the functional plan takes shape.

Actions are being taken to obtain a permanent campus in Richmond. At this time we are analysing data from a study on the region's educational requirements and are considering possible sites. While a degree of optimism prevails, no decisions nor approvals have yet been forthcoming.

I have spent the last two weeks meeting with the administrators to listen to the progress of the Divisions and to discuss matters they have raised. Further consideration and appropriate action relating to these matters will occur. I would urge you to discuss concerns with your Directors as such discussion is essential to the College improving its services.

The College community has made substantial progress in the past few months. Our continuing challenge is to build on our strengths.
