# College and Federal Bank to Help Surrey Business

The Federal Business Development Bank and Kwantlen College have launched a new community business program to assist Surrey companies in developing their businesses.

The program will provide management skills and learning opportunities for small businesses so that they can expand their business to meet market needs.

Over a one-year period 32 businesses will participate in workshop sessions followed by individual on-site practical counselling.

The program objectives are:

- Reduce risk of business failure
- Accelerate owner and business development
- Maintain existing employment levels and create new full-time jobs
- Design and make available relevant workshops

- Assist owners in achieving business goals
- Encourage the development, analysis and use of records and information systems.

Kwantlen President Adrienne MacLaughlin called the program a "marvellous opportunity" for local businesses to access the skills needed to grow and compete in larger and more sophisticated markets. She added that Surrey, one of the fastest growing municipalities in Canada, will particularly benefit from the program.

The Minister of Advanced Education and Job Training, Stan Hagen, heralded the new initiatives and said, "It is important

Rational Emotive Therapy Education is for people who want to learn and apply some of the main principles and techniques of RET to everyday living, to overcome some of their self-defeating thoughts, feelings, and behaviors, and to enjoy life more.

Rational Emotive Therapy Education consists of experiential exercises, discussion, and demonstrations with workshop participants. It is designed to help you learn to disrupt self-defeating habits of thinking and behaving, to encourage new ways of looking at yourself and others, and to help you to develop more effective and enriched living.

- Surrendering perfectionistic tendencies
- Discovering irrational beliefs

leading to emotional upsets

- Vigorously disputing these irrational beliefs
- Dealing with unproductive anger
- Overcoming low frustration tolerance
- Challenging depression
- Eliminating procrastination
- Setting and achieving practical life goals

While there is no magic and while any benefits you may receive from RET require work, by actively participating you may increase your capacity to identify, understand, and optimize your feelings; you may see reality differently; and you may learn to cope with your problems and handle your upsets more effectively.


## Leona Gom Wins Award
